This was the view of a succession of speakers at the third annual Women in Information Technology conference .....(17).....in London on Wednesday.



### GM cheese from cloned cows

New Zealand scientists say their cows are twice .....(26).....productive. They have created the world's first cloned cows that produce special milk which can increase the productivity of the dairy industry.

The researchers in Hamilton say a .....(27).....of nine transgenic cows are now producing highly elevated levels of milk proteins, casein, which are vital for .....(28)......

### The Finsbury Park mosque attracts police attention

### Online shopping over the Christmas period

### Motor neurone disease

What is motor neurone disease?

Motor Neurone Disease (MND) is a group of related diseases affecting the motor neurones in the brain and spinal cord.

Motor neurones are the nerve cells along which the brain sends instructions, .....(72).....of electrical impulses, to the muscles.

Degeneration of these cells leads to weakness and wasting of muscles.

Some groups of muscles are ....(73).....

The symptoms are usually first apparent in the arms or legs. Initially, they tend to be mild, and can include stumbling and difficulty holding objects.

Weakness and wasting in the muscles supplying the face and throat can also lead to problems with speech and difficulty chewing and swallowing.

In the advanced stages of the disease, a patient may become almost totally immobile. The rate of progression of the disease, however, varies enormously from patient to patient.
