CCTV 'no answer to street fights'

CCTV(1)..... in town centres do not stop drunken street violence breaking out, according to new research.

But cameras do alert police to assaults and reduce the number of people treated at(2)..... departments. Scientists also say CCTV has reduced the severity of injuries suffered in street brawls.

Scientists also say CCTV has reduced the severity of injuries suffered in street brawls.

But the study, published in the Injury Prevention journal, concludes there is no evidence of the surveillance systems having a(3)..... effect.

It says: "The benefit of CCTV might lie less in preventing such offences... but more in facilitating a faster police response to arguments or assaults in public spaces, which limits their(4)..... and therefore reduces the incidence and seriousness of injury."

Experts from the University Hospital of Cardiff, who carried out the research, also concluded official police statistics on violent crime were inadequate and "inappropriate".

They found police statistics recorded only a quarter of assaults leading to treatment in hospital.

The evidence shows you can't rely on police violence statistics as an accurate measure of violence in the community

The authors of the study say it was the first to compare police and hospital data and that its four year time(5)..... was longer than other CCTV evaluations.

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Online media rival sues Microsoft

Internet media company RealNetworks has sued Microsoft, accusing it of(31).... monopolising the growing market for digital music and video.

Accusing Microsoft of "predatory conduct", RealNetworks has asked for more than \$1bn (£564m) in compensation.

"We believe our business would be substantially larger today if Microsoft were playing(32)..... the rules," chief executive Rob Glaser said.

Microsoft has denied the allegation, insisting the market was competitive.

Microsoft pointed out that RealNetworks was the number-one provider of digital media technology(33).... that it was using antitrust law in order to protect and increase its market(34).....

The RealNetworks lawsuit runs in parallel with a/an(35)..... by the European Commission into Microsoft's media-playing software.

Brussels is concerned that Microsoft (26) med the dominant share of the communication of the communication.

Brussels is concerned that Microsoft(36)..... used its dominant share of the computer operating-system market to force users to adopt its media technology.

In its lawsuit, RealNetworks said Microsoft's monopoly meant that every Windows user had to take its media player, "whether they want it or not".

Pilot in court over drink claim

The Virgin Atlantic pilot accused of attempting to fly an aircraft while(41)..... the influence of alcohol was due in an American court on Monday.

Captain Richard Harwell was arrested on Friday night shortly before he was due to fly across the Atlantic. If(42)....., the 55-year-old, who is American but lives with his family near Oxford in the UK, faces up to five years in jail.

He was held after airport staff allegedly(43)..... alcohol on his breath.

Capt Harwell was escorted off the plane, which was due to fly from Washington DC to Heathrow, by airport authority police.

At Monday's hearing he will be formally accused of the offence and is expected to apply for bail.

On Sunday Virgin Atlantic chief executive Steve Ridgway told BBC News staff were shocked and saddened

by the affair.

He said it was the first time such an incident had taken place in the company's almost 20-year history.

US Democrats in first key battle

Democrats wanting to challenge George W Bush are facing their first major test, with a(61)..... race in the state of Iowa.

Candidates are making final efforts to sway voters before what may be a record turnout for the local caucus gatherings which start at 1830 (0030 Tuesday GMT).

Results from the caucuses(62).... within hours, with implications more important than the mere allocation of delegates who go on to pick the Democrat nominee.

As the first closely watched test, results may(63)..... or bury candidates.

Opinion polls from the midwestern state, traditionally the first to make its choice for presidential nominee, show the race between Howard Dean, John Edwards, Richard Gephardt and John Kerry is too close to call. A win for Mr Dean would add to his status as(64)...., while anything but a strong showing could spell doom for the Gephardt campaign.

Mr Gephardt is a congressman for the neighbouring state of Missouri and has played(65)..... his own midwestern(66).....

Neither Mr Kerry nor Mr Edward had been expected to win in Iowa and a high placing would give their campaigns new impetus as the focus switches to areas where each should count on strong support, correspondents say.

The next vote comes later this month in New Hampshire -neighbour to Mr Kerry's home state of Massachusetts- and is followed by the primary in South Carolina, where North Carolina senator Mr Edwards was born.

Pope John Paul II, Israel's two chief rabbis and leading Muslim clerics were among the audience for a first performance of a new(69)..... work by an American composer.

The Varican says the musical evening was intended to promote the(70)..... to peaceful co-existence among all the children of Abraham.

The title of the work receiving its premiere at the Vatican on Saturday night was, very appropriately. Abraham, the name of the biblical patriarch revered(71).... members of all three faiths.

Also in the programme were movements from Constant Mobiler's Constant Constant.

Also in the programme were movements from Gustav Mahler's Second Symphony, known as The Resurrection.

The inter-faith theme of the concert was echoed among the performers—a mixed choir consisting of singers from the London Philharmonic, from Turkey, from the Pope's own home town of Krakow in Poland and from Pritsburgh in the United States;

The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra was under the baton of Gilbert Levine, an American who used to direct the Krakow Symphony Orchestra and who is a personal friend of the Pope.

Alitalia strike hits travellers

Italian national airline Alitalia(72)..... 364 flights on Monday as its staff began a one-day strike against job losses.

Alitalia said it expects about 18,000 passengers to face disruption to their journeys as a result of the(73).....

Alitalia's management wants to shed 2,700 jobs to stem the(74)..... airline's financial losses, and prepare it for a partial privatisation.

The strike is the third major transport stoppage to hit Italy this year.

Check-in desks at Rome's Finnicino airport were deserted on Monday morning as the strike started to(75)....., Reuters news agency reported.

Alitalia's unions have called an 8-hour stoppage between 0900 and 1700 GMT on Monday. Their plans include a lunchtime protest outside the Finance Ministry in Rome.

Alitalia's management revealed job cut plans in October, setting out a timetable to complete the cut backs by

"We want the plan withdrawn and discussions to start again from(76).....," said Stefano Pietrini, a spokesman for Fit-CISL trade union.

The layoffs are part of a management(77)..... print to return the airline to profit in 2005, in the hope that

it may then be able to form a three-way(78)..... with Air France and Dutch airline KLM.

The Italian government removed one(79)..... to the potential alliance in November 2003 when it passed a decree permitting the privatisation of Alitalia, which is currently 62.3 % state-owned.

But the Italian airline's finances remain a(80)..... block. The carrier has forecast an operating loss of more than 400 m euros (\$ 495 m; £ 275 m) this year.

Air France and KLM announced they were joining forces in September 2003.
